**Subject:** People with dyslexia struggle with reading and writing. Fortunately, there are wonderful assistive technology tools to help them. For example, a book can be scanned into a computer, which then reads it aloud while highlighting the text on the computer screen; a dictated report can be inputted into a computer, which then produces the written report for editing on the screen; and a software program can create diagrams, flow charts and outlines to improve essay writing. Electronic dictionaries, note-taking pens, and other high-tech and low-tech tools are also available.

At this workshop you will have the hands-on opportunity to experience, and experiment with, some of these amazing technologies. Technology does not eliminate the need to read and write. However, it can help dyslexic children learn, and it can make reading and writing easier and faster for dyslexic children and adults. Dyslexic individuals, their families, teachers and other concerned individuals are all welcome.
